No Cemetery services may be conducted on Sundays or holidays recognized by the City as employee holidays.

Grave Lot

- A grave lot is any set aside space for the purpose of interments and may include multiple graves. The number of graves allowed in a space is determined by size of lot and type of interment.
- A grave lot must be permanently pinned in each corner and recorded as such in the Individual Lot Record. Each lot will be assigned a section and lot number.
- Existing grave lots may be subdivided into new lots.
- Space within a grave lot may be bought, sold, transferred or donated by the owner to other private individuals or families. All transfers or transactions must be submitted to the City of Athens and kept on record.
- The City of Athens may purchase vacant grave lots and individual spaces from the owner at a price no greater than the current sale price of said lot.
- The City of Athens may receive donations of vacant individual graves or grave lots.
- The City of Athens may sell, transfer, or use lots that have been donated, purchased, or created by the City of Athens at their sole discretion pursuant to ORC 759.11 and City of Athens Ordinance 0-60-15.
- The City of Athens may sell aisle spaces for the purpose of new graves.

Record Keeping

The City of Athens maintains a physical record of all lots as well as a digital copy. The physical record is considered the primary record.
